

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

What is AHEC?

The Area Health Education Center (AHEC) network includes more than 300 program offices and centers spread across the United States. Maine's Program Office resides within the UNE Center for Excellence in Public Health. It works closely with Maine's three Regional AHEC Centers to address health care workforce needs across the state.

PIPELINE PROGRAMS

These programs expose middle and high school students to health careers while encouraging them to pursue post-secondary education in health care fields. Programming includes job shadowing, career fairs, camps, panel presentations, and other hands-on, innovative opportunities engaging more than 700 students a year.

CARE FOR THE UNDERSERVED PATHWAY (CUP) SCHOLARS

This 2-year, extracurricular program helps graduate-level health professions students gain the leadership skills to succeed in their future health care fields. The program includes rural health immersions, Maine-based case competitions, and various clinical and community experiences. Through these activities, students learn how social determinants affect the health of a community, how to care for rural and underserved communities, and how different members of a health care team interact to meet patient needs.



COMMUNITY BASED EXPERIENTIAL TRAINING

Part of AHEC's mission includes developing and implementing population health focused training modules that enhance the service learning and clinical experiences for Maine health professions students. For example, the Reproductive Health Leadership Program enhances student skills in providing contraception counseling through classroom learning, discussion, and hands on activities. AHEC is always exploring ways to support hands-on learning for health professions students in Maine.

CONTINUING EDUCATION AND TRAINING

AHEC's continuing education and training programs help Maine health care professionals improve the quality of care they deliver to medically underserved and rural communities throughout the state. These experiences focus on helping providers understand the social determinants of health, strengthening their cultural competency, and developing their interprofessional practice skills.
