Participation in these activities equates to 80 hours of didactic and 80 hours of community-based experiential learning during the two- or three-year enrollment. <u>YEAR 1:</u>

- AHEC Scholar Orientation Get to know your fellow Scholars and take a deep dive into the AHEC Scholars Program (One 2-hour evening meeting, on Campus, September 2024)
- Community Engagement Expo Gain foundational and hands-on learning for the community-based experiential training opportunities throughout the year (4-hour event, on the Portland UNE campus, Saturday morning, September 2024)
- Didactic Lessons & Facilitated Debrief Participate in a combination of in-person and virtual sessions on unique topic areas (Fall Semester: One 2-hour in-person session, One online session. Spring Semester: One 2 hour in-person session, One online session.) Reflective journal submissions are required for both online sessions.
- Rural Health Immersion (RHI) Complete a 3-day rural health immersion in Maine. RHI experiences focus on unique public health and healthcare challenges and strategies in rural and underserved communities. This multi-day (all expenses paid) opportunity combines interprofessional service learning, integrated clinical health experiences, and community-based experiences to demonstrate what it's like to live and work in rural communities in Maine. (Offered over March Spring Breaks, mid and late-May, and early June)

<u>YEAR 2:</u>

- Maine AHEC Case Competition In small interprofessional teams, investigate a systemic health issue affecting communities in Maine and develop a case analysis that focuses on building a better healthcare system (Work on this program occurs during Spring 2025, Summer 2025, with final presentations in Fall 2025)
- □ **Health Equity Capstone** —Though clinical and community-based learning opportunities, apply the critical knowledge and skills gained through the AHEC Scholars Program to promote health, address health disparities, and improve health equity in an underserved community in Maine or beyond. (40 hours during a clinical or fieldwork experience).
