Poll: Majority of Mainers favor casino

PORTLAND - Nearly 60 percent of Mainers said they would support a casino in Maine when read a question likely to appear on November's ballot about whether to allow a casino in the state, according to a poll released Thursday.

In a statewide survey taken April 4-17, 57 percent said "ves" when read the

wording of the referendum question: "Do you want to allow a Lawmakers eye casino to be run by the Passamaquoddy Tribe and Penobscot Nation if part of the revenue sharing is used for state education and municipal revenue sharing?"

Forty-one percent responded "no" and 2 percent didn't know or wouldn't answer.

But when asked a general question about whether they support or oppose the idea of building a casino in Maine, without mention of revenue sharing, 47 percent of the respondents said they supported a casino. Fifty percent opposed it and 3 percent didn't know or wouldn't answer.

"Clearly the wording of the question directs some people who otherwise oppose a casino to support it," said MaryEllen Fitzgerald, president of Critical Insights, the market research firm that conducted the survey.

According to the survey, support for the referendum question was strongest in central-western Maine, where 60 percent said they would support it, and northern Maine, where 66 percent favored the referendum. Demographically, support was strongest among people ages 18 to 34, those earning less than \$50,000 a year and people without a See Casino, Page B5
