Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) Reaccreditation



After a two-year departmental and curricular intense self-study, the UNE MSOT Program hosted $lap{1}_{\circ}$ on-site ACOTE accreditors in April 2025. This visit and our self-study documentation resulted in Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education the maximum reaccreditation status of 10 years with no areas of non-compliance nor suggested

areas of improvement. Thank you to all our faculty, professional staff, fieldwork supervisors, employers of graduates, current students, alumni, and UNE leadership for their help in creating such a successful outcome!

Transition of Leadership

Dr. Kris Winston is now the Director of the Maine Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental and Related Disabilities (LEND) Program. LEND is a federally funded project aimed at expanding resources to people with autism spectrum disorder and other neurodevelopmental disabilities. LEND provides year-long traineeships to students and practitioners who receive mentoring and leadership development opportunities, and work closely with community partners. Dr. Winston's role with the LEND program will be 50% of her time, with the remaining 50% of her time as a faculty member in the OT program. UNE is grateful to Dr. Winston for agreeing to take on this very important leadership role, and for her years of outstanding service as the OT Program Director.

OTD Curriculum Development



We are in the process of developing an entry-level Occupational Therapy Doctoral (OTD) degree track, while also maintaining the current Master of Science in Occupational Therapy (MSOT) degree. The MSOT program will also move to a fall start date in 2027.

UNE OT Hosted the MEOTA Fall Conference October 4, 2025

UNE was proud to host the Maine Occupational Therapy Association (MEOTA) Fall Conference featuring keynote speaker, Katie Brandt, discussing "Connecting

for Care: Integrating Person Centered Care Across the Lifespan." 

UNE Occupational Therapy Students Lead in Interprofessional Excellence

Over the last three years, **19 OT students earned the Interprofessional Honors Distinction**, a nationally accredited digital credential upon graduation. This distinction allows them to showcase their understanding of advanced teamwork, communication, and leadership skills. The required immersive projects and public presentations helped prepare them for collaborative clinical practice—skills employers increasingly seek.

Peer reviewed publications with faculty mentors



Dakota Rodgers, MSOT '22 (*left*) contributed to a published study in the Journal of Interprofessional Education and Practice, revealing that students who participated in intensive IPE rated their collaborative skills significantly higher than peers, and saw benefits of that expertise as they moved into clinical practice. Alumni reported applying these skills directly to improve patient care, team dynamics and leadership in the workplace.



Impactful community interventions

Hannah Hutchins, MSOT '24 (*left*) presented nationally at the National Center for Interprofessional Practice and Education Nexus Summit, highlighting her work on harm reduction kits for individuals reentering the community after incarceration. Her interprofessional team addressed urgent personal needs of people experiencing substance use disorder and partnered with the Cumberland County Jail to support improved public health through safer transitions back to the community.

Dr. Dapice will work with Dr. Nancy Shore of UNE Online (School of Social Work) and Professor Krysten Gorrivan of UNE College of Arts and Sciences (School of Education) on a qualitative research project examining the experiences of school personnel in Maine K-12 public schools who have implemented Canine-Assisted Intervention programs.




Health Careers Exploration Camp

The students did a wonderful job engaging the campers and the activities they presented, including a rousing relay race filled with adaptive equipment reflecting the interactive nature of OT. UNE Students Engage in Global Health and Climate Change Courses in Brazil & Norway

In August, Gabriela Puentes, MSOT '26 and Sara Grenier, MSOT '26, joined UNE physical therapy students and faculty for a 10-day, grant-funded travel course in



Sara Grenier explained "Brazil was an amazing experience with the opportunity to work with and learn from differing cultures and disciplines. My team was tasked with addressing healthcare disparities across migrant/immigrant/refugee/displaced individuals in Brazil. During our time at the institute, we learned about the rise of Dengue fever, a vector borne illness, in Brazil due to recent climate changes. Given its increase in prevalence, we chose to create a resource to educate individuals on this disease to better prepare them and help minimize their risk. A highlight of the trip was the opportunity to interview with members of the local community, which consisted of both older adults and migrants. These interviews provided a deeper understanding of the challenges faced by members of the community.

Overall, the opportunity to participate in this institute provided a unique immersive experience to the Brazilian culture."



Topics include changes in vision, exercise for all abilities, no-stove healthy cooking, managing grief and loss, home safety concerns, and managing chronic pain symptoms.
