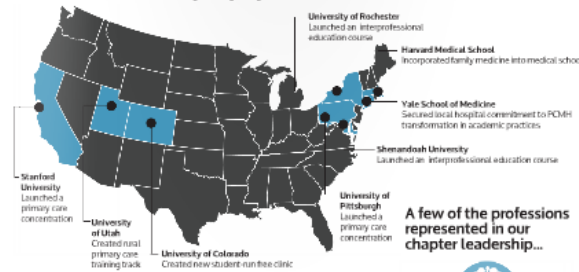

Dr. Morris-Singer is a physician and former community organizer and trainer, with over 15 years of advocacy experience. In Spring 2009, Andrew founded the precursor to PCP to advocate for improved primary care programming at Harvard Medical School. As the President of Primary Care Progress, Dr. Morris-Singer has been instrumental in igniting an interprofessional, trainee-led grassroots movement to reform primary care delivery and training. Dr. Morris-Singer writes and speaks regularly on the topics of primary care community advocacy, utilizing organizing strategies to advance primary care clinical innovation and the critical role of trainees in the revitalization of primary care. Dr. Morris-Singer is board-certified in Internal Medicine and is an Affiliate Instructor at Oregon Health and Science University.

The overall goal of Andrew's visit is to educate and inspire students and providers about getting involved in primary care transformation. The long term goal is to create and sustain a vibrant Primary Care Progress interprofessional student chapter based in the medical schools of MMC/Tufts and UNECOM.

After attending the town hall, participants will leave with:

- 1) enhanced knowledge about the pertinent local issues impacting the present and future practice of primary care,
- 2) three or more venues to get involved in local/state practice and policy transformation efforts,
- 3) knowledge of how Primary Care Progress can support transformational relationships and systems efforts, and
- 4) networking with students, faculty, and providers of primary care and other health professionals.

After attending the leadership training, participants will leave with:

- 1) leadership and advocacy skills as applied to primary care transformation,
- 2) a network of like-minded students, faculty and providers interested in channeling collective efforts to improve our health system and the health of our communities.
