I sponsored and wrote a bill that made Maine Indian history mandatory for all public schools in Maine. This is now law. I continue to advocate for economic self-sufficiency for Maine Indian people.

Upcoming Meeting of the Maine Advisory Committee

Let me begin by again thanking you all for your patience and continued support. As I've advised, Rachel Talbot Ross has graciously agreed to serve as chair for the remainder of the charter period, which ends December 5, 2006.

I have spoken or exchanged voice messages with virtually all committee members. All agree on a date, Thursday, May 25; time, 1:00 PM - 5:00 PM; location, Portland; and topic, briefing update on draft report, "Racial and Ethnic Profiling and Harassment in Maine;" and followed by a planning meeting.

Possible Agenda: I suggest that we begin the day with an orientation (30-45 minutes), which is not open to the public - I will provide an agency status report. The briefing would last from 90-120 minutes and would be transcribed. We would conclude with a planning meeting to consider possible topics and approaches for a new project.

Attached for your review is the draft report, "Racial and Ethnic Profiling and Harassment in Maine." Chapter 4 summarizes the panel presentations, which included representatives from the advocate community and federal, state and local government officials. With up to two hours set aside for the update, the matters to be resolved are: how many presenters, should we draw from those identified in Chapter 4 or are there new resource people to consider, and do you want to set aside 30 minutes to take brief oral statements from the public?
